
Week 1: March 25th-28th; Week 2: April 1st-4th; Week 3: April 8th-11th.

So far, in the whole-staff CPD space we have met with 27,596 teachers; 8,760 teachers attended our second teaching subject workshops last September and October, while over 22,000 teachers engaged in our subject CPD school cluster events this year. 

The L1LPs/L2LPs team will continue visiting special and mainstream schools up to the middle of May. Assessment of Level 2 Learning Programmes is school-based and ongoing. Students create a portfolio of evidence, which demonstrates their achievement of learning outcomes over the three years of Junior Cycle. Evidence can be hard copy, audio, video, blogs, photographs, artefacts and so on; this promotes much more accessible learning and assessment activities. This multi-modal form of assessment provides opportunities to showcase a students strengths, skills and talents.

On 1st March, the team held our first Inclusion Conference jointly hosted with the NCCA. The event was a highlight of the year, and we look forward to continuing the work on Universal Design for Learning, Inclusive Teaching, Learning and Assessment as we move into next year's CPD.

Outreach work has seen the team presenting for Down Syndrome Ireland events, NCSE, Short Courses symposium, and going forward IATSE.




Subject Updates



We will also be making reference to the element of sustainability through the lens of the sustainable development goals (DES, Action Plan). 


Subject Updates

Student Voice: Bridge to Learning

The Student Voice — The BRIDGE to Learning project empowers students to participate meaningfully and collaboratively in improving their experience of school, encouraging their engagement in learning and improving teacher-student relationships.







JCT and NCCA have been working collaboratively with nine schools and over twenty teachers in Cavan / Monaghan ETB and Cork ETB in a three-year Erasmus Plus project, Student Voice – Bridge to Learning.

This project, which aims to develop different models of working in partnership with students in schools and in classrooms, will reach completion this June.

The teachers, students and schools involved have explored learning and teaching approaches that activate and develop students' voices, with a view to enabling students to become more active agents in their own learning.

The project will provide different models of working in partnership with students by giving them a voice and developing their skills and attitudes to become responsible and democratic citizens. The aim is that young people will benefit in a range of different ways: increased confidence, self-esteem, responsibility, communication skills, qualities of leadership, and quality to listen to others.

Students will become more active learners and consequently develop their self-regulating abilities.



Student Voice the BRIDGE to learning

Their engagement and motivation will increase by giving them a voice. Students will develop their competencies to become responsible and active citizens.

Teachers will reflect upon their teaching practices in order to optimize the learning of the learners. Thus, they will build commitment and capacity to work in partnership with students. The learning for all partners involved in this project has been immense. This collaborative work has key learning to share on the experiences of teachers and students pursuing more authentic student voice in the school and in the classroom.

It also illuminates the impact a collaborative approach has on teachers professional development, in addition to the effect this has on students' experiences in the classroom.

Tracing the journey of this project to date, reveals the challenges and opportunities that exist in embedding a culture of student voice in every classroom in every school in Ireland.

JCT would like to thank the schools and teachers involved in this project. Their engagement with young people is truly inspiring and JCT is very excited to be now working on ways of sharing this learning with more schools and teachers across Ireland.


JCT is also facilitating a **Philosophy webinar** as part of our Weeks of Webinars programme. This webinar is titled Junior Cycle Philosophy: An overview of assessment. The webinar will take place on Thursday 11th April 2019, from 6.15pm-7.15pm. Teachers can register to attend this webinar by clicking here.

The Philosophy CPD events are focused on exploring the Philosophy specification. The specification is structured into ten strands, all students must engage with Strand 1, which is the foundational strand. Teachers then select four of the remaining ten strands to engage with, depending on the interests of the students and teacher. The Philosophy specification can be accessed from here. Further information about assessment in the Philosophy Short Course is available from here.

The Philosophy Short Course specification supports a wide variety of approaches to assessment. Some learning outcomes lend themselves to once-off assessment, others to assessment on an ongoing basis as students engage in different learning activities such as questioning, discussing, arguing, explaining, listening, collaborating and presenting. In these contexts, students with their teachers and peers reflect upon and make judgements about their own and others' learning, based on feedback they give and receive. Ongoing assessment can support the student as they develop their skills in philosophy and in preparing for the Classroom-Based Assessment

Short Courses and Wellbeing

When planning a Wellbeing Programme schools should consider the NCCA developed short courses in PE, SPHE and CSPE. These are the result of widespread consultation with education partners to ensure that the courses address important, relevant and meaningful learning for young people in these subjects (Circular letter 0079/2019).




Short Courses

Physical Education

For the very first time in the history of Irish education, the Framework for Junior Cycle (2015) allows students at junior cycle to profile their learning achievement in **PE** on their final certificate, which is now known as the Junior Cycle Profile of Achievement (JCPA).

This is within the wider context of the introduction, on a phased basis, of PE as a Leaving Certificate subject, and the exciting introduction of a new Senior Cycle Framework in PE. PE is also a Wellbeing related short course. The JCT presentation provides further information on PE and Wellbeing within the Framework for Junior Cycle.



At Junior Cycle, students may profile their achievement within the PE short course through the Classroom-Based Assessment (CBA). First year students that enter in September 2019 have the potential for the NCCA-developed short course in PE to be reported upon within the Wellbeing section on a student's eventual JCPA. This is in addition to the maximum of 10 subjects or its equivalent.

It will be possible for students who enter first year in September 2019 to undertake one or more of the NCCA Wellbeing short courses as part of a Wellbeing Programme, in addition to a maximum of four other non-wellbeing short courses. (Ctrcular 0079/2018, p.25)

There is an element of choice and flexibility regarding the CBA in PE. Each strand of the short course has an associated assessment. Students should demonstrate their learning in a minimum of two from the six potential physical activity assessments outlined in the Assessment Guidelines (e.g. Personal Physical Activity Programme, Team Orienteering Event, Performance Assessment in Athletics).



The CBA is an integral part of the normal teaching and learning that happens in PE class and are designed to encourage students to strive for overall improvement in the selected physical activity.



Leadership Spring Workshop

The Spring Leadership seminar 2019 focuses on 'Student-centred Strategic Planning'. This nationwide engagement with School Leaders commenced in Tralee Education centre on the 19th March. The leadership team will provide 45 workshops nationally running up until the 9th May. This seminar aims to support School Leaders in deepening their understanding of how to plan a Junior Cycle curriculum which is needs and context driven, and student centred in approach. This professional learning experience for Leaders follows three key threads; School Autonomy, Student at the centre and Decision-making processes. This builds on and is supported by the previous professional learning opportunities leaders have engaged in with JCT.

The Framework for Junior Cycle (2015) gives autonomy to schools to create a flexible curriculum responding to the learning needs of all their students and the unique context of their school Looking at our School 2016: A Quality Framework for Post Primary Schools highlights effective and highly effective practice in the Domain, Leading Learning and Teaching, in which School Leaders are tasked with managing the planning and implementation of the school curriculum.

Considering the *Framework for Junior Cycle (2015)*, participants will explore a school scenario which documents how one school reviewed their curricular provision and, how they moved from 300 hours to 400 hours of timetabled wellbeing provision as part of this review. After exploring the scenario, participants reflect on what the Junior Cycle student experience looks like in their school and what process they may need to undertake to ensure that the curriculum offered in their school is student centred in design. During the workshop participants will reflect on the vision for Junior Cycle which places the student at the centre of their own educational experience and explore how the curricular decisions School Leaders make in their schools can put the student at the centre.

This day of professional learning will allow space for discussion with colleagues around effective ways of leading the process of curriculum development in the schools you manage.

As explored in previous workshops, teaching, learning, assessment and the reporting of learning in Junior cycle has changed. These changes are having a significant impact on the learning experience of students in the classroom and on how teachers plan. In the workshop we will take time for School Leaders to reflect on how these changes have been embraced and communicated at a whole school level to ensure consistency and coherency of practice across the school.

During this day participants explore some of the new aspects of the recent Circular 79/2018 and consider what may be the implications for their school curriculum particularly in the area of wellbeing provision, assessment and reporting.



As School Leaders, we need to understand the rich learning for students in the classroom-based assessments and the similarities and differences between them so that we can facilitate a process with teachers that is collaborative, sensitive and flexible in manner. A possible process which could be used to negotiate the school's assessment and reporting calendar for 2019/20 is outlined in the workshop.

Junior Cycle Profile of **Achievement**

As part of the Framework for Junior Cycle (2015), the reporting process at junior cycle culminates in the award of the JCPA to students.

The JCPA captures student achievements in a number of assessment elements undertaken over the three years of junior cycle, including the grades in the state-certified final examinations at the end of the three years. It will also report on students' achievement in Classroom-Based Assessments (CBAs) in subjects and short courses, and in Level 2 **Learning Programmes** (L2LPs) and, in time, achievements in Level 1 **Learning Programmes** (L1LPs).

The JCPA provides an opportunity for schools to acknowledge and celebrate their students achievement. participation or progress in other areas of learning that may have been included in the school's junior cycle programme.



Engaging Parents/Guardians in Junior Cycle

Assessment in Junior Cycle is changing to recognise and value the different types of learning that take place in schools. Students are at the centre of teaching, learning and assessment. This will allow for a more rounded assessment of the education of each young person, enable students to express their learning and provide them with opportunities to grow and flourish as learners. 
