Key Skill in focus: Being Literate

This skill allows learners to develop good literacy skills, promotes "lifelong learning", self-esteem and overall quality of life. It also helps students in:

- Developing their understanding and enjoyment of words and language
- Reading for enjoyment and with critical understanding



- Writing for different purposes
- Expressing ideas clearly and accurately
- Developing spoken language
 - Exploring and creating a variety of texts, including multi-modal texts.

Technology Tips

Book Creator is a website and app for creating digital books and developing literacy skills. Students can create their own resources by combining text, images, audio and video to create:

- Interactive stories
- Digital portfolios
- Research journals

Students can publish a digital book on a particular theme or create a book to present research they have carried out. Students might choose to present their CBA research in this way. It allows students create a finished product, giving them a platform for sharing their learning with peers or others.

Suggested strategy for learning in the socially distanced classroom

A useful strategy for being literate is peer feed-back. It provides students with an opportunity to learn from each other and improve their own work. This strategy compliments peer assessment by using success criteria. Both of these strategies have been updated for the socially distanced classroom and if engaging with learning from home.
