Junior Cycle Principles: Engagement and Participation

This month's focus is on the key principle Engagement and Participation. Regarding this principle, the *Framework for Junior Cycle* (2015), page 11, notes:

The experience of curriculum, assessment, teaching and learning encourages participation, generates engagement and enthusiasm, and connects with life outside the school.



Engagement and Participation in RE

This particular principle applies to the whole curriculum, including RE which we will look at in the next section of this month's newsletter.

Engagement in RE offers students opportunities to explore and engage with the range of diverse beliefs and cultures around them. In the RE specification, students are encouraged to think, debate and engage with a variety of topics. Our RE classroom should therefore be a place where discussion thrives and a space which can facilitate student engagement with the "BIG" questions and issues about the world around us. In doing so, the RE classroom can help foster values such as tolerance, respect and understanding in addition to promoting responsible citizenship.

Engaging with Sacred Artefacts

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The JCT Religious Education team attended a national forum about the teaching of world religions in the Chester Beatty Library in association with MIC Limerick and the Dublin City Interfaith Forum. It was a most enlightening day of both reflection

and discussion as we creatively explored symbolism and the use of artefacts in the different religious traditions. Click here for a short video that captures some highlights from the day.



JCT RE team leader, Dr Ailís Travers, presented a talk at the event about the use of sacred artefacts and online museum collections in teaching and learning. This centred on the role of creativity in Junior Cycle. In particular, she highlighted the importance of asking questions to spark creativity, curiosity and engagement in the Junior Cycle RE programme. Classroom strategies to support learning creatively with physical artefacts and digital resources developed by the JCT RE team were shared with participants.

RE and the Arts

Taking its cue from Charles Dickens' A Christmas Carol, It's a Wonderful Life's central character is a despondent and despairing George Bailey who feels a failure for never having left his town of Bedford Falls. After inheriting his father's business and falling for

the girl next door, Bailey finds himself stuck in a situation that will test his patience, his inner strength and his family's love. By staying at home, however, George doesn't realise how



many lives he has touched throughout his existence. As the film develops, we see George embark on a journey of self-discovery as he learns about the really important and fundamental things in life.

Director Frank Capra's seminal work explores themes that are relevant to the JC RE classroom: the human search for meaning, the value of a human life, the importance of friendship and community.
