tion, and of working life."

Learning to learn in RE encourages students to understand themselves better as learners and help them to become more confident, connected and engaged in their learning. As RE teachers, therefore, we aim to put the student at the centre of the teaching and learning by developing more active and collaborative learning opportunities for students. In doing this, we create a balance between the development of the subject knowledge and the development of key skills.

## **Technology in the Classroom**

Podcasts are spoken word, audio episodes, all focused on a particular topic or theme and a great way of increasing student engagement in the RE classroom. Getting students to make their own RE podcasts can be an effective way to consolidate their knowledge.

Podcasts can also be used to provide information in a fun and entertaining way and extend student learning with critical links across the learning outcomes of the RE specification.

Instead of relying solely on written material, podcasts can allow students—particularly those with visual impairments or learning difficulties— more options in how they work and complete assignments.

Overall, as a digital learning tool, podcasts are an effective way to take in and present information which can help keep students engaged for longer.



#### **RE and the Arts**

On our recent cluster days, teachers shared examples of religious themes in contemporary film, literature,

art and music. This month, we will focus on music and song as a potentially powerful and creative tool that can be incorporated into the RE classroom.



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One of the most popular music choices from our cluster days so far was U2's 1987 release, "Still Haven't Found What I'm Looking For".

The song describes the journey that we as humans

are on in our quest to find meaning and purpose in life, suggesting that all worldly desires can never completely fulfil this particular search. The ways humans look for that "something" and the avenues in which we try to find it

ultimately lead nowhere.

In terms of influences, "I Still Haven't Found What I'm Looking For" exhibits influences from gospel music in its description of this spiritual yearning. The song is one of three U2 classics featured in a recent poll of the 500 greatest songs of all time by one of the world's most respected music magazines, Rolling Stone. In terms of JC RE, its themes could be used to explore a number of the learning outcomes in the specification.
