Junior Cycle Principles: Creativity and Innovation

This month's focus is on the key principle Creativity and Innovation. Regarding this principle, the Framework for Junior Cycle (2015), page 11, notes:

Curriculum, assessment, teaching and learning provide opportunities for students to be creative and innovative





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Creativity and Innovation in RE

The principle of Creativity and Innovation in RE encourages both teachers and students to be imaginative, curious and open-minded in their approach to learning. Since Spring 2020, RE teachers have become even more creative and innovative in their response to the pedagogical challenges by

adapting to the evolving situations in which we found ourselves.

To address these challenges, the

JCIS has updated its strategies to ensure our RE classrooms re-

main creative and innovative spaces. RE teachers can draw upon these repurposed teaching and learning strategies to foster creativity and innovation in both the physically distanced classroom and for students engaging with online learning from home. They are available for download on https://jct.ie/jcis/classroom strategies and will also support RE teachers in continuing to nurture creativity in student learning in the unusual circumstances in which we find ourselves.

Technology in the Classroom

Although creativity is not predicated on the use of technology it can support developing creativity in the online space. To encourage and nurture this

creativity further, the RE team have introduced a number of technology tools in our monthly newsletters to support engagement with creativity and the other key skills in the RE classroom.

Used creatively in the RE classroom, these digital supports may help students bridge the learning gaps created by the disruptions over the past two years. Students may also find them useful in creating their own videos, posters and presentations to demonstrate evidence of learning.

RE and the Arts

Continuing on the theme of creativity, Disney Pix-

ar's Soul explores the theme of trying to find purpose in life through meaningful work. The film's main insight is simple: there's more to life than our accomplishments. This simple message is embodied in the character of Joe Gardner (Jamie Foxx), a part-time music teacher



who has greater aspirations to perform professionally as a jazz pianist. His whole life is encumbered with reaching this one goal, but when he finally gets his break with Dorothea Williams (Angela Bassett), Joe takes an unfortunate fall that nearly destroys his dream, casting him into the afterlife. There he meets 22 (Tina Fey) who has no interest in life on earth or what seems to give life meaning. From there, the two set out on a mission to find 22's "spark."

Like our previous suggestions, Soul is a film teachers might find useful in the classroom over the coming months when covering a variety of learning outcomes from the RE specification.
